## **CHAIR OF GOVERNORS' INTRODUCTION**

Dear Parents, Carers and Guardians

My name is Norma Collin and in September 2023 I assumed the position of Chair of Governors, having previously served as the Acting Chair and Vice Chair.

It is evident that despite the pandemic being over, the impact on disrupted learning has had an impact on our school. However, when we look at our data to measure performance and improvement it is gratifying to see that it shows unmistakably significant improvements and a commendable rise in overall performance across key areas such as Literacy, Numeracy and Science.

It was truly gratifying therefore to witness the positive impact on pupils' performance in their GCSEs. The recent results have brought about a commendable 4.10% increase in students achieving top grades, this is double the 2022 results. We also saw substantial increases in Skills Challenge, which focuses on pupils' broader abilities, a rise of 9.3% at National Level and 3.13% at Foundation Level, and the results for Welsh Baccalaureate, a qualification that emphasizes skills and experiences showed 12.17% increase at National level and 7.46% increase at Foundation Level. Remarkable achievements, so huge congratulations to the class of 2023.

As we celebrate these attainments, we acknowledge that this success is a collective triumph, a testament to the dedication of our teaching staff, the support of families and the commitment of our students. It is my sincere belief that with this momentum we will continue to elevate the standards of education and inspire a life-long love for learning among our students.

This positive progression in all results serves as motivation for us to continue refining our educational approach. The implementation of the New Welsh Curriculum continues, which will ensure that every student reaches their full potential. Together, we look forward to building on this success and fostering a culture of continuous improvement and achievement within our academic community.

In Years 7 and 8, our curriculum is aligned with our school vision, focused on providing students with opportunities to enhance their physical and emotional well-being, ignite a passion for learning, and build resilience to achieve their dreams and aspirations. We prioritise the development of key skills such as Literacy, Numeracy, and Digital Competency, while also fostering essential life skills including creativity, innovation, critical thinking, problem-solving, planning, organisation, and personal effectiveness. Our inclusive and challenging curriculum offers a rich educational experience for every student.

Throughout these years, students engage with diverse Areas of Learning and Experience, covering Languages, Literacy and Communication, Mathematics and Numeracy, Science and Technology, Humanities, Expressive Arts, and Health and Wellbeing. This approach ensures a comprehensive understanding across disciplines, encouraging students to make connections in their learning. This holistic educational experience aims to deepen their knowledge, skills, and understanding, enabling them to appreciate the relevance of their learning to both Wales and the global context.

#### **KEY STAGE 4**

At Key Stage 4, students continue with compulsory subjects including English, English Literature, Maths, Numeracy, Science, RE, Core PE, Wellbeing, Welsh, and Welsh Baccalaureate. Additionally, they have the opportunity to personalise their curriculum for Years 9, 10, and 11 through our options process. This process empowers students to select subjects they are passionate about, allowing them to develop a deeper understanding over the three-year GCSE period.

The range of subjects offered initially is broad, including three vocational courses with a greater emphasis on coursework. Each year, the options are tailored based on student preferences and staff availability. While we endeavour to accommodate all choices, some subjects may not be feasible if there is insufficient interest. This approach ensures a dynamic, student-led curriculum that not only meets educational standards but also aligns with the interests and aspirations of our students.

#### ALN PROVISION

Throughout both Key Stages, we provide comprehensive support for students with specific learning difficulties. Our approach begins with high quality teaching, encouraging mainstream learning engagement as much as possible. This is complemented by learning support within teaching groups, as well as specialist small group or one-to-one sessions within our well-resourced ALN department. Catering to a wide range of needs, our school collaborates closely with external agencies and professionals like Educational Psychologists, Behaviour Support, Speech and Language Therapists, CAMHS, and Flintshire's School Nursing Service to address the unique requirements of each student.

Our Additional Learning Needs Faculty maintains strong connections with partner Primary Schools, ensuring a smooth transition for ALN students from Key Stage 2 to Key Stage 3. At Ysgol Treffynnon, we prioritise effective and informative communication processes, facilitating seamless transitions between years and key stages. This approach guarantees that students with diverse learning needs continue to feel happy and secure within our school environment.
